A Letter From The Rector

On the Feast of Pentecost, Sunday, May 31, it is entirely appropriate that we will be (re)dedicating the All Saints' Chapel in our churchyard. Formerly Mrs. Sidley's dovecote retreat, this lovely stone building in the northwest section of our churchyard was converted to a chapel when the Sidley property was purchased in the 1950s and was dedicated The All Saints' Chapel on September 10, 1961. The chapel has served as a place for quiet and retreat in the midst of our churchyard which is itself a place of beauty and rest.

The 1961 dedication included memorials to Margot Atkins, Sarah Eckhart Stevenson, Frederick Boger, George Fulmer Getz, Francis Donnelly Shane, Conrad Bernard Shane, Frank Alexander Buckley, Rose Reford Rosser, Wesley Horace Loomis, and Emily Snyder Price. The conversion of the dovecote was begun under the direction of The Rev. Charles Schreiner, Rector of Christ Church, and was consecrated by The Rt. Rev. Gerald Burrill, Bishop of Chicago.

Over the years the condition of the chapel deteriorated. Repair and restoration have been underway since last September, and include the following work: stained glass window restoration, custom millwork and carpentry for the door and woodwork, staining and painting, electrical work, roofing, gutter/downspout and tuck-pointing work, tree removal and pruning, and drainage and landscaping improvements.

We will give thanks for this wonderful effort on the Feast of Pentecost, May 31, in a procession following the 9:30 a.m. Eucharist. Our thanks is conveyed to a number of people for their work, support and influence on this project: Elise Covey, Patrick Corrigan, Neal Luken, Phil Massey, Gill and Jeremy Farmer, Anne Taft, and Barbara and Bob Spencer. The unrestricted bequest of Sue Rutherford will fund the major portion of these costs and a plaque in the chapel will honor her memory. "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." (Psalm 122)

“Coins for Change”: A World of Good

A very sincere thank you to all of you who participated in our Lenten Offering to benefit our companion parish of St. Michael's in the Diocese of Renk, Sudan. As you know, the 100 children who attend St. Michael's currently have no teacher nor school. One of the highest priorities of the Episcopal Church of Sudan is to provide the education these children so desperately need and so deeply desire. Together, our “Coins for Change” added up to just over \$1600. A primary school teacher in Sudan can expect to earn between \$100 and \$200 a month, which means our offering could help the Episcopal Church of Sudan pay a teacher's salary for one school year.

Our ingathering on April 26th was followed by a wonderful celebration. Parishioners enjoyed some tastes of Sudan, including baseema, basboussa, and aish. (We have included a copy of the recipe below because so many folks requested it.) A highlight of the celebration was our very own global, fair trade market, which was held in the Lea Room. The market featured items from Ten Thousand Villages, an organization committed to helping thousands of artisans all over the world. We sold olive wood crosses, baskets, jewelry, toys, note cards, sculptures, and more. Items came from all over the world, including Mexico, Guatemala, Pakistan, India, Kenya, Egypt, and more. Each item made by hand. Each purchase doing a world of good. A World of Good Takes the Form of Baseema

Here's the recipe for BASEEMA, a sweet, coconut cake from Sudan. Leave out the coconut, and it's called BASBOUSSA. Either way, it's delicious!

BASEEMA

5 large eggs
1 C confectioner's sugar
6 oz. vegetable oil
16 oz. plain whole milk yogurt
2 tsp. vanilla extract
2 C all-purpose flour
4 tsp. baking powder
1 C angel flake coconut
1 C granulated sugar
1 C water
2 T fresh lemon juice

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Coat bottom of 9" x 13" baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside. Beat eggs and sugar in large mixing bowl. Add oil, yogurt, and vanilla extract. Mix well. In a separate bowl, sift flour and baking powder. Add to the yogurt mixture while stirring. Stir in coconut. Pour mixture in prepared pan. Bake for 30 minutes or until top is golden brown and center springs back when touched.

While the Baseema is baking, prepare the syrup. Mix granulated sugar, water and lemon juice in saucepan. Bring to a boil and boil gently until the syrup is slightly thickened. Remove cake from oven, prick the surface gently with a fork and pour the syrup evenly over the entire surface. Let cool completely before cutting. Surface will be golden brown and glossy. Enjoy!

After graduating from Mercersburg Academy in PA this month **Peter Jones** will attend Colby College in Maine this fall.

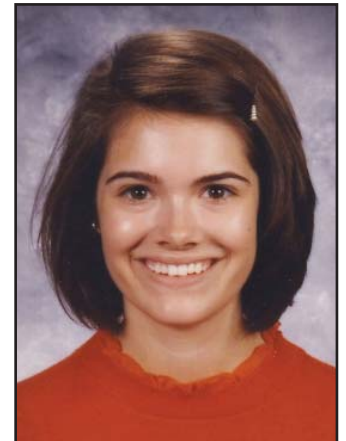


Senior, **Chris Harris**, graduated from New Trier in May and has been recruited to play football for Trinity College in Hartford, CT in the fall.

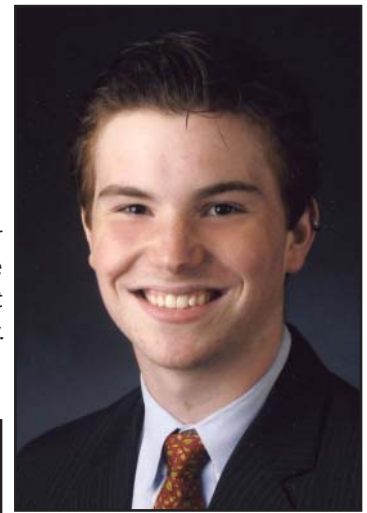
Recent high school graduate, **Amanda Ryan**, will head out east in the fall to attend St. Lawrence University where she will also play D3 tennis.

Bev Holmes Prevost

Providing Hidden Strength

If you have ever doubted the presence of the Holy Spirit, you need go no further for reassurance than to spend some time with Bev Prevost. In addition to music, salt water, tennis, and the importance of family and human connections, the role of the Holy Spirit is woven throughout the life of our Rector's wife of almost 40 years.

A born and bred (New) Jersey girl, Bev Holmes was raised in Englewood, New Jersey. The daughter of a Wall Street investment banker and a domestic engineer (a.k.a. a stay-at-home mom), Bev went to Dwight School (now Dwight-Englewood) through her sophomore year. She then attended Dana Hall (boarding) School in Massachusetts which "provided a real chance for me to grow (music, musical theater as 'Laurie' in "Oklahoma", concerts, Boston). It opened a much broader world for me." She enjoyed a general Liberal Arts education first at Bradford Junior College in MA for two years and then attended Hollins College (now University) outside of Roanoke in the Blue Ridge Mountains of western Virginia where they had "long springs, long falls, and panic if it snowed." (How nice does that sound?) Bev received a BA in English Literature and took a lot of music history courses which she loved.

After college, Bev had several first-job opportunities along the East Coast. The Holy Spirit led her to accept a position in 1966 with Houghton Mifflin Publishing Company in NYC which allowed her to be close to her family on the other side of the Hudson River in Englewood. Her mother passed away from cancer two years later. After sharing a microscopic apartment for those two years with two other girls, the Holy Spirit made his (or her) presence known once again: Realizing that she wanted to actually remain friends with her roommates, Bev went looking for alternative living arrangements in Manhattan. She found a larger (not hard to do) two-bedroom apartment which then necessitated a fourth roommate. Enter Ann, a friend of a dashing young seminarian named Ned Prevost. On the evening of Election Day 1968, Ann invited Ned to watch the returns and meet her new roommates. The next day Ned called Ann to find out just what the story was with one particular roommate. Ned and Bev shared an immediate and deep love of music, tennis, and the ocean, and Ned always has said it was her smile that captivated him. Their first proper date was in early December, Ned proposed in early January, and they were married a year later in June 1970, (after Ned's graduation from The General Theological Seminary), in St. Paul's in Englewood (where, Holy Spirit again, one of our Christ Church choristers, Noah Wynne-Morton, was organ scholar recently while at Juilliard). Bev has frequently been asked through the years how she felt about becoming a "clergy wife", and her response has always been: "It seemed perfect to me: besides loving Ned, I have always loved people, children, and music. My "role" has always combined all of these elements."

Ned and Bev spent three years at St. Paul's in Wallingford, CT, eight years at St. Paul's in Southington, CT, where their two daughters, Elizabeth and Marnie, were born, eleven years at St. Paul's in Fairfield, CT (are you noticing a trend here?) before Ned was called to Christ Church in Winnetka in 1992. Bev acknowledges with much gratitude the role that the Search Committee played in smoothing out what was a major move for her. She was leaving her much adored salt water of the East Coast and the comfort of Marnie's, a recently-diagnosed type-1 diabetic, doctors. Teaching an eleven-year-old to monitor life-threatening glucose levels is no small challenge. And Elizabeth was just starting Trinity College back in Hartford, CT. Despite their hesitations, the Prevosts fell in love with the people at Christ Church and the water of Lake Michigan and moved into the Rectory two days before the fall Rummage Sale. How's that for trial by fire? (They were properly forewarned by the Search Committee not to leave anything on the lawn, as it would most likely be sold.)

Bev has always found spiritual comfort in singing. Starting in grade school, throughout schools and colleges, and in every parish, she has been a faithful member of choirs, acappella and theater groups. At Christ Church she joined our then fledgling choir and soon jumped into Rummage as co-chair of Treasures for about five years before moving into the French Room. She has also graciously hosted the Rummage Post-Party and the Chairman Appreciation Luncheon for many years and has always loved offering hospitality, at church gatherings, fair luncheons, and countless parties and receptions in all their rectories.

In 2001, a fellow member of the Seabury-Western Woman's Board, Jackie Kraus, invited Bev to meet and welcome the newly-arriving Lost Boys of the Sudan whom Bev had been reading about with keen interest, and this involvement became a major focus of Bev's life for about five intense years. As the relationship between the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago and Sudan grew, companion

relationships were established between individual Chicago parishes and fledgling parishes in Sudan. Christ Church, having by then formed its Global Mission Committee, created a companion relationship with St. Michael's in Paloch, Sudan (and with Jesus de Nazareth, La Esperanza, S.E. Mexico). In fact, the proceeds from our most recent Lenten offering, Coins for Change, are going towards education for our friends in the Sudan. After five years on the Board of CALBOS, Bev realized that she needed to pull back as these now adult Sudanese men began to act for themselves. Although she is no longer actively involved, the "boys" hold a special place in her heart and prayers.

Another major theme and calming presence in Bev's life is the existence of a teeny cottage on the teeny island of Cuttyhunk off the coast of MA. At the age of two, Bev was swimming in the Atlantic Ocean off the shore of Fire Island in Point O'Woods, NY. Anyone who has grown up near the ocean knows that once the salt water gets into your veins there is no looking back. The Holy Spirit once again played a major role in taking Ned and Bev to Cuttyhunk which has something to do with the line ads in the New York Times, a Greek family renting out that same teeny cottage in the early 1980's, and the death of Ned's Godfather (ask Bev for the details). Suffice it to say that Bev, Elizabeth, Marnie, and Ned, when he was able, spent and spend wonderful summers out East. Bev transferred her Rummage skills to Cuttyhunk where she has been the co-chair of the Cuttyhunk Methodist Church Fair which "is over in about five minutes."

Bev sees her major role as supporting her children and her husband. Eldest daughter, Elizabeth, is married to Mike Guenther, and lives in Grinnell, Iowa where she is an Assistant Professor of History at Grinnell College. Second daughter, Marnie, is married to Matt Weir (son of an Episcopal priest!), lives in Sunnyside, NY, and is a museum educator at the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine on the Upper West Side of NYC. Bev's serene presence, grounded faith in the Holy Spirit, and unwavering support of our Rector of seventeen years are key ingredients to Ned's success. Spend an evening in the Rectory which is the location of many of our church gatherings (Newcomers, Rummage Chairs, Vestry, etc.) and you will experience Bev's genuine love of people and the role that God has chosen for her life.

In closing, I have to tell a personal "Bev" story which I am allowed to do since I am the Parish Paper Editor. New to the area, I was doing my Episcopal church shopping in June of 1994. One Sunday, I thought I would check out the beach service at Christ Church. The first person I met as I was getting out of my car was this really nice lady who offered me her extra beach chair. I went home to Jim and the boys and said that I had found our parish home. The rest is history. Tell me that isn't the work of the Holy Spirit.

Churchyard Guidelines

The Christ Church Churchyard for the interment of ashes is one of our parish's true treasures. It is a beautiful place of serenity, peace, and meditation that has been a part of our parish life since 1939. It is in the tradition of the hallowed churchyards of English country churches with the exception that ours is for the exclusive burial of ashes. Parishioners who wish to purchase plots in our churchyard may direct their inquiries to Molly Ethridge, Parish Administrator, mollydsm@christchurchwinnetka.org, 847-446-2850, ext. 23.

The Churchyard was originally conceived as a "green garden." In more recent years parishioners have adorned the spots where their loved ones are buried with small, white flowering plants, both perennial and annual, as well as with flowers of other colors. In order to provide some guidelines in these matters the following suggestions are made:

It is preferred that natural materials be used and that their height not obscure plaques. Also, these plots are quite small and we need to be sensitive to those plots belonging to other parishioners that are immediately adjacent. Plastic materials are inappropriate. The Churchyard Committee is charged with maintaining the Churchyard but asks that parishioners be reminded that the watering of plants or flowers is the responsibility of family members or friends. There is a watering system in place, for the grass and the euonymus, that is not designed for any other plantings. Wreaths and other seasonal offerings should not remain beyond their green and fresh appearance. Maintaining the churchyard will continue to help all of us enjoy its beauty.

A Quiet Presence Retires

How To "Do" A Beach Service Or Summer Service 101

If you have not experienced one of our summer "beach services", you are in for a real treat. Let us start by explaining that it's not exactly on the beach, but in a lovely park overlooking the beach. Starting Sunday, June 22 and running through August 31 the service starts at 9:30 am at the Maple Street Park on Sheridan Road in Winnetka. It is just south of the Church On The Hill. Here is a Beach Service Primer that will ensure a great experience:

- 1) It's B.Y.O.B. or C.. You should bring your own blanket or chair.
- 2) Always a good idea to bring bug spray.
- 3) The shade can be chilly. (We do live near Chicago. You know...colder by the lake.) Bring a sweater or sweatshirt.
- 4) The dress code is no code. Shorts and a t-shirt are most appropriate.
- 5) Children often frolic in the background.

If you happen to attend when a baptism is planned (June 29, August 3 or August 31), you have hit the jackpot. At the appropriate time in the service we gather at the shore of Lake Michigan for the Thanksgiving Over The Water and the clergy carry the candidate into the water. Very exciting. Hope you can join us.
