A Taize Novice Hooked For Life

The cantor's strong, pure, rich voice breaks the silence and welcomes you to the service. The choir, seated behind the congregation, joins in offering close, haunting harmony. Their voices surround and hug you as you sit in your pew. The words repeat "Stay here and keep watch with me. The hour has come. Stay here and keep watch with me. Watch and pray." The lights are low. Votive candles flicker from all corners. Taize has begun and what an hour it is. The program notes state: "We have busy souls. This liturgy is primarily for the worship of God but is also meant to quiet the soul. This quietness does not happen all at once, but gradually during worship. Then we may be still and be at peace in the presence of God."

The cantor begins again. Psalm 103 is sung alternating high and low voices. The words express waiting for God, as followers have done for thousands of years. As I watch the black wick of my candle increase from a blue flame to a full, dancing yellow light soaking up oxygen and filling the darkness around me, I can feel God sitting next to me. The music repeats "Come Holy Spirit. Kindle the fire, the fire of your love."

We sit in silence together. Each with our own light. The harmony begins anew. As we repeat "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom" we bring our candles up to the altar and place them next to the image of Jesus on the altar. You just know in your bones that Jesus will, and does, remember you. The sense of peace is profound.

The hour long service, which felt more like twenty minutes, is behind me. The only question left in my mind as I drove home was "When is the next one?" I am hooked.

Alas, Richard tells me that the next one is not until the fall. You should make a mental note. Next time it is on our calendar. Just come.

Now is the time.

who is the principal and headmaster of St. Gregory's Episcopal School in Chicago's North Lawndale community. Since its founding in 1962, as an institution of the Diocese of Chicago, nearly 2,000 boys have graduated from St. Gregory's. The school offers a rigorous academic curriculum, small class size (no more than 15 students per classroom), guidance and shepherding through the high school selection and application process; and counseling for students and their families when necessary. St. Gregory's is a major recipient of Benevolence Grants from our annual rummage sale.

Vestry Notes - September 22, 2009

Kim Dougherty started the meeting with a meditation on "Travelers" – the next time you travel, open your eyes and heart to those surrounding you and see what you can learn about yourself and them in the process.

The Rector & Associate Rectors reported. Ned will share at two Sunday Forums highlights of his sabbatical in Turkey to study "St. Paul and the Early Church", and he reported that Christ Church's Choir Trip to Salisbury Cathedral - a tremendous success as over 100 parishioners/choir members performed spectacularly as the 'choir in residence' for a week in England. Josh reported on upcoming formation activities and his new job at Grace Episcopal Church and Day School in New York – his last Sunday will be October 25th. Jeanne reported on the many pastoral activities over the summer including 6 baptisms, 3 funerals, 6 graveside services, a wedding, Mario's progress, and the hiring of a new organist. Robin congratulated Jeanne on the great job she did while Ned and Josh were away.

Kathy Shanley (Treasurer): the Church's auditors provided a preliminary annual audit to the Vestry which will be further reviewed by the Vestry before acceptance at our next Vestry meeting. The YTD financial results of Christ Church were presented to the Vestry which reflected the continued shortfall in pledge revenues. We expect to be in a significant shortfall position for the full year which will be funded by tapping into our savings to balance our budget for the full year.

Robin Anstaett (Outreach): our fall worship season started with two successful Ministry fairs. Summer rummage revenues were up 10% to \$34,000. Overall items donated are down, but hopes are high for a successful 85th Rummage sale on October 1st. Flyover had help from the Boy Scouts and the Clevenger's students. Kim Dougherty (Formation): 247 children are registered for church school led by 45 adult volunteers. We also have 92 high schoolers that we hope will be active in our senior youth group. Youth confirmation classes this year will be held in 3 separate 6-week sessions that will be held from 4 to 6 pm on Sundays to facilitate a better quality experience for our prospective confirmands.

Lisa Kerpan (Global Mission): Bishop Joseph visited from our companion Diocese in Renk, Sudan and preached at our 9:30 service on September 20. Bishop Joseph and Bishop Benito were in the Diocese this past weekend. Lisa and Gary Martin attended separate diocesan meetings with both Bishops. We viewed pictures of a new "rickshaw" that was purchased by Bishop Joseph with a donation from the Healys.

Buffy Ervin (Pastoral Care): 12 volunteers are helping with funerals and meal deliveries. Currently two families are receiving meals. 16 volunteers are helping deliver flowers. Three parishioners are being visited weekly by our lay chaplains and are receiving communion.

Melanie Cody (Member Development): we have almost 30 new families at Christ Church since last September and are working on the upcoming New Members gathering at the Rector's home as well as our upcoming potluck dinner at the Hambletons. The Welcome Committee is all set with all wearing green aprons at services. Our Mentor Program has taken off and our volunteers are helping new members get settled in the church.

Steve Hudson (Warden) presented a summary of our "Home Gatherings" which took place in the spring and involved 90 parishioners plus six host families. Overall, the meetings were very positive with feedback and ideas from our parishioners on how we might grow the church and increase the financial support while the church continues to find ways to reduce expenses. Feedback from the Home Gatherings will be reviewed by the Vestry with a committee possibly formed to work on further developing ideas that came out of the Gathering's process. We discussed how critical our Stewardship campaign is this fall to make sure that we can fully fund the operations of Christ Church next year.

Other Business: Kim Dougherty, Steve Hudson and Lisa Kerpan were elected by the Vestry to represent Christ Church as lay delegates at the upcoming Diocesan Convention in November. Gris Ware and Pat Corrigan were elected as alternates.

Ned closed the meeting with prayer.

While Fr. Daniel's congregation has grown, his church is quite literally falling down. Last year's rainy season has washed away nearly all of the mud-based "mortar" that was holding the walls of St. Michael's in place. A new zinc roof and large pillars to support that roof are high on the Bishop's priority list for St. Michael's and the other churches in his diocese that are in a similar condition. His main priorities for the Diocese of Renk continue to be: education, health care, and agricultural and economic development. Bishop Joseph asks that we continue to walk the path to peace and reconciliation with him and our brothers and sisters in Sudan and he offers this prayer:

"May we continue to seek and serve Christ in all people, strive for peace and justice, and respect the dignity of every human being." AMEN!

Computer Science? No, Thanks. I Want To Make Music.

You may know "our" Alice as the amazingly talented French horn player in the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Or you may know her as the wife of the equally amazingly talented, world-renowned first chair CSO French horn player, Dale Clevenger. Or you may know her as the mom of those handsome young men (and, yes, musicians) Mac and Jesse whom you have watched grow up in our choir. Or you may know her as the baker of those sinful, serious chocolate brownies that wonderfully appear during Rummage. Or you may know her as a living miracle who is defying some serious cancer odds. Or you may know her as the beautiful woman who is a breath of fresh air and an inspiration to us all.

Alice Anne Render was born in Nashville and raised in Louisville, KY where she lived until she went off to college. Music has been a part of her world since day one with her parents and paternal grandmother, whom Alice was named after, lighting the path to her future success and happiness. Her grandmother played the violin in the Detroit Symphony which was a very unusual accomplishment for a woman at that time in history. Alice's first instrument was the piano which she began to study at age 10. By the age of 15 she was ready to move on and was offered the chance to take up the oboe or the French horn. (Grandmother Render's influence was felt when she said, "Oh, no, dear, you don't want to have to make reeds for the oboe. Play the French horn.") At age 15 Alice played her first solo horn performance, the Andante movement of Mozart's Third Horn Concerto, accompanied by her grandmother on the piano.

When it was time to move on to college Alice's high school music teacher told her there was only one place to go. The Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University. Alice said, "Fine." She auditioned and she got it. Her very practical father, who was a very practical judge for a living, was supportive of Alice but wanted to be sure that she would be able to put a roof over her head. He said, "You get to pick one major and I get to pick the other." Alice chose music. He chose Computer Science. Alice did graduate with a dual major from Indiana University. She admits that her father's choice of a major actually made her into a better musician. She hated Computer Science so much that she practiced extra hard and extra long to insure that she would be able to make a living with her music. She has succeeded.

After graduating from Indiana U. she won a spot in the Civic Orchestra, the training orchestra for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and where she "learned the essence of my instrument. I was awed and humbled." The Civic is also where she crossed paths with Dale who was the coach for the French horn section and her mentor. Alice allows as how "it wasn't love at first sight." In 1984 at the age of 23 Alice was invited by the CSO to fill a vacant French horn spot for their European Tour. She never looked back.

Alice and Dale's lives intertwined through their music, the CSO and many mutual friends who often socialized as a group. Dale eventually showed up solo with roses and chocolates. Alice accepted. After each had negotiated the rocky shores of failed marriages they were married in 1988 and moved to Warwick Ave. in Winnetka where they still live today. Their eldest son, Mac, recently graduated from George Washington University. He is living in DC and doing what all upstanding, newly-minted grads do in today's challenging economy. He is working in a bar and playing guitar in a Blue Grass Band. Younger son, Jesse, is a 2009 graduate of New Trier High School and will attend Alice's alma matter, Indiana University, where he will be playing (you guessed it) the French Horn.

In addition to music, church and service have always played a large role in Alice's life. Alice's grandmother believed that you could get a first class religious education in many churches, but if you also wanted first class music you should join an Episcopal church, thus Alice's Baptist parents raised her in the Episcopal Church. It was natural for Alice to seek out a new parish home in Winnetka. What was unique is that her new parish home actually sought her out. One fall day Alice's front door bell rang. She opened the door to an unknown man who introduced himself as the rector of Christ Church, Frank McClain. "He was wearing a collar so I let him in. He welcomed me to the neighborhood, visited for a bit, and then said, 'So, Robin, do you have any questions for me?'" He had knocked on the wrong door. "Our new next door neighbors, Kurt and Robin Anstaett, had recently filled in a visitor's pew card at Christ Church. Frank hooked two families at once. That's the work of the Holy Spirit."

Alice jumped right into the ministry of Rummage first working in the Infant Department with Mary Ward, then she dabbled in Furniture, Toys and finally landed in the Boys department and "hasn't left the basement since." (If you time it right, the basement is where you will find her famous brownies.) She has also served as an acolyte and is active in the Soup Kitchen ministry.

Alice's life changed drastically when she was diagnosed with cancer and given four months to live. That was in 2003. You do the math. Her dear friend and doctor, Pat Logan, said upon delivering the emotional diagnosis, "Alice, this script isn't over and you get to write it." Dr. Logan wrote her a note that she posted in a strategic place so that she would see it when she first woke up every morning. It said, "Dear Alice and Dale: Faith sees the invisible, believes the incredible and receives the impossible. Let's begin this battle together. Love, Pat." The note is still there.

Alice chooses not to be defined by her cancer but rather by her survivorship. She is defined by an amazing support network: her family, her friends, her neighbors, Christ Church, the CSO, Winnetka, Kenilworth, Sears School, New Trier, The Silver Lining Girls, "not to mention half of Kentucky, Australia and Italy." She would be lying on her living room floor after a tough round of chemotherapy thinking "I don't know if I can do this" when she would be overcome by a wave of goodness. "Call it the power of positive thinking, good karma, the power of prayer. Call it whatever you want to call it. It worked." Lucky for us, it is still working.

Youth Choir Trip - Salisbury, England - August 2009

The Christ Church Choir trip began in August with four days of intense rehearsals to prepare for its in-residence visit to Salisbury Cathedral. This Youth Choir visit to the UK was part of an ongoing series of trips which began with our first trip in 1998 to Lichfield Cathedral. Upon arriving in England, we enjoyed three days of sightseeing and fellowship before our "official duties" began. The Cotswolds, Oxford and a full day in Wales (including Sunday services at Llandaff Cathedral, lunch in the capital city of Cardiff, and dancing at ancient Chepstow Castle) were among the highlights before arriving in Salisbury for our one-week stay.

Our time in Salisbury for our group of 90-plus people took on a comfortable (yet rigorous!) rhythm of rehearsals, sightseeing, and near-daily Evensong services. Our homes for the week were The Rose & Crown Hotel (with its eager ducks) and Sarum College for the adults, and The Cathedral School for the youth choristers and chaperones. We became very familiar with the town and Cathedral of Salisbury (especially after that Tower Tour!) and felt like "regulars" as we discovered favorite restaurants, shops, and seats in the Cathedral Quire.

During our time in Salisbury, we also visited nearby destinations including the town of Winchester and its famous cathedral; the Isle of Wight (via ferryboat!) and Osborne House, Queen Victoria's summer home; the mysterious Stonehenge which dates from 2,200 B.C.; and Old Sarum, an Iron Age camp whose stones were used to build the Cathedral in Salisbury.

The musical offerings of Choral Evensong by our choir each evening in the Cathedral (except Thursday) were the highlight of our trip. Of particular beauty was the music performed to celebrate the Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Trinity Chapel of the Cathedral. Our choir members rose to the occasion each day and were wonderful representatives of Christ Church.

Our traditional end-of-trip party recognized the talents of our tour organizers, our organists, our leader, Richard Clemmitt, and the choir's success in singing seven beautiful services in seven days. Our college-age choristers wrote and performed Psalm 156 to celebrate the happy conclusion of Christ Church Choir's sixth trip to England. A copy of this original Psalm has been included for your reading enjoyment.

Christmas Wreath Sale

Our Youth Choir once again is sponsoring a wreath sale to help support its tour fund. In February of 2010 our boys and girls will travel to New York to sing at The Church of the Heavenly Rest and The Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

You can decorate your home for the Christmas season by purchasing a wreath identical to the ones hung at our church at Christmas. The following sizes are available:

- 12"** @ \$22.00 a good size for a candle ring or small door
- 18"** @ \$27.00
- 22"** @ \$32.00
- 26"** @ \$36.00 the size on the church doors

These fragrant, handsome wreaths are composed of noble fir and enhanced with blue-berried juniper, golden incense cedar and cones. They will come with a red velvet bow. As in the past, dimensions listed above are the diameters of the wreaths measured from the outer edges of the greenery.

The wreaths must be ordered, with payment, by Monday, October 26.

They will be available for pick-up on the patio at the Church on the Hill on Sunday, November 29 (or later, if you prefer a later pick-up date).
